2020 Win: **Cal/OSHA Enacts Emergency Rules** for COVID-19 **Prevention**



In response to months of campaigning by workers and advocates, Cal/ OSHA recently adopted new rules designed to strengthen COVID-19 protections for all California workers. The COVID-19 Prevention Emergency Temporary Standard went into effect on December 1, 2020.

An incredible coalition of nearly 50 occupational safety and health (OSH) organizations, labor unions, worker centers, and community groups supported the effort to secure these vital workplace protections.

Huge thanks to everyone involved with this campaign: those who crafted strategy, wrote letters, testified, and helped spread the word. It was truly a movement-wide effort made possible by dedicated workers and advocates from around the state. The difficult work of outreach, education, and enforcement lies ahead – and we will do it together!

HELPING WORKERS FIGHT FOR THEIR RIGHTS

Worksafe is certified by the California State Bar to provide legal support services to the state's Qualified Legal Service Providers (QLSPs). As a Support Center, we aim to increase the capacity of QLSPs to assist lowincome and immigrant clients facing workplace safety rights violations.



Bay Area Contractor Cited for Health and Safety Violations

After an investigation conducted by the Maintenance Cooperation Trust Fund, a group janitorial workers, with the aid of Worksafe and Centro Legal de la Raza, filed complaints with Cal/OSHA because workers were being exposed to harsh chemicals without proper training, personal protective equipment, or emergency protocol. The citations, issued in August, total more than \$42,000. Read the full press release here.


Work During Coronavirus

SHARING HEALTH & SAFETY KNOWLEDGE

In 2020, Worksafe promoted access to justice for low-wage and immigrant workers by providing free training and technical assistance to legal aid programs, worker advocacy groups, and unions. We continue to be the only legal services organization in California focused on worker health and safety.

California must be prepared to protect outdoor workers from the dangers of wildfire smoke. For the past two years, Worksafe has coordinated

In 2019, our coalition succeeded in getting Cal/OSHA to pass an emergency standard for wildfire smoke. In 2020, we focused on enforcement of the emergency rules, and we continued to campaign for a strong permanent standard.

SB 1257 was authored by Senator Maria Elena Durazo and co-sponsored by the California Domestic Workers

Safety for All Workers Act. This important legislation would have ended

the historic, discriminatory exclusion of "household domestic service"

Coalition, Worksafe, Equal Rights Advocates, California Employment Lawyers Association, and AFSCME-UDW.
